Program Overview

- Purpose of public art is to build awareness about the city's water infrastructure and to catalyze action surrounding environmental challenges
- Two parallel parts of the program:
 - 3 public art projects designed by professional artists selected to participate in the Civic Arts Fellowship
 - 2 public art projects designed by youth artists from the Young Artist Movement (YAM) program at the NET Charter High School working with Carl Joe Williams

10 artists selected to participate in fellowship based on portfolios and letters of interest

Fellows learn about St. Anthony history & water challenges at the neighborhood, city & coastal level



May 2020: Meet the Artists Online Event

Fellows share preliminary proposals for feedback



July 2020: Selection Committee Meeting



"Woven Together"






- The two painted portraits are interwoven on sections of the same surface, at 45° angles from each other. • They align from a certain perspective. This is often referred to as a lenticular image
- The reverse side is identical in structure, but the imagery would be developed in dialogue with residents.


