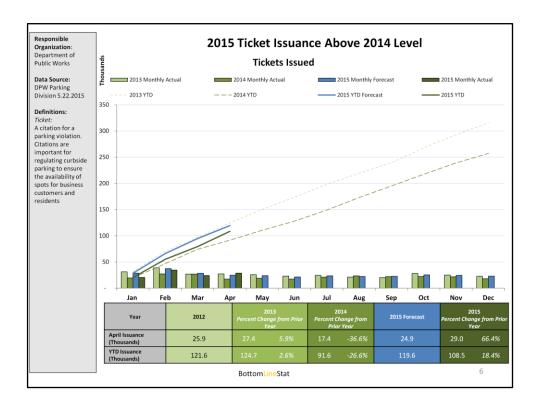
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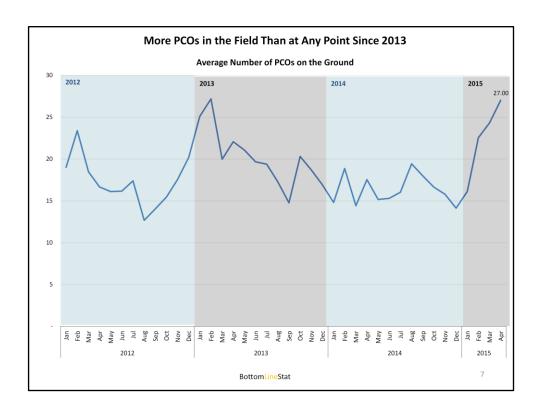




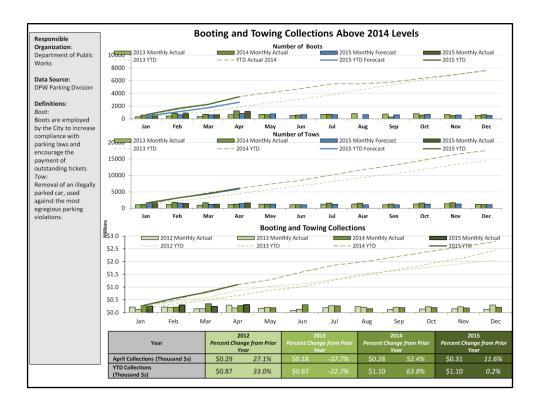


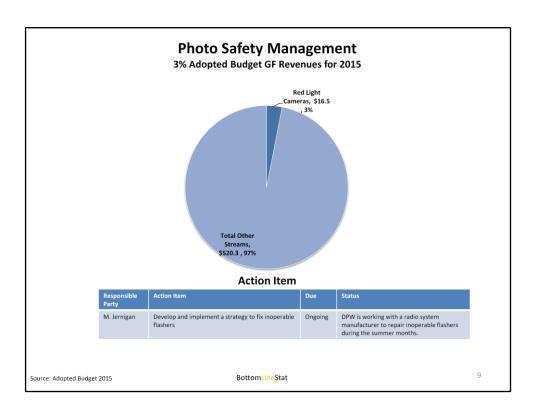
Parking collections are largely a product of PCO staffing, which was very low at the beginning of 2015 but has steadily increase. DPW anticipates that collections will continue increasing in upcoming months due to new PCOs continuing to come onboard.

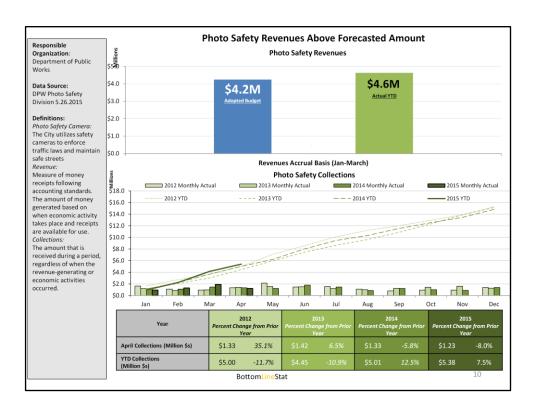


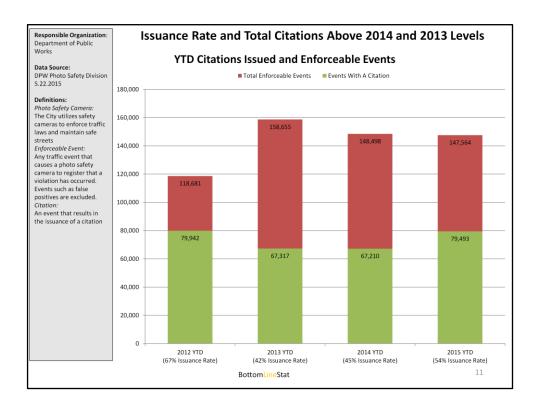


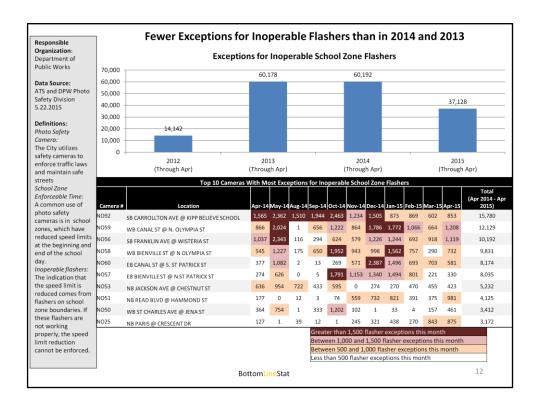
DPW reported that an additional class of PCOs should be trained and in the field by early July.



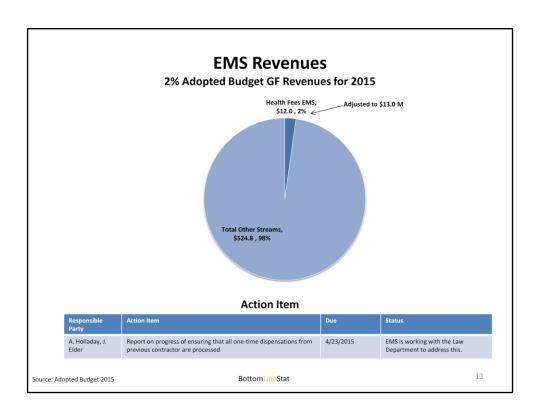


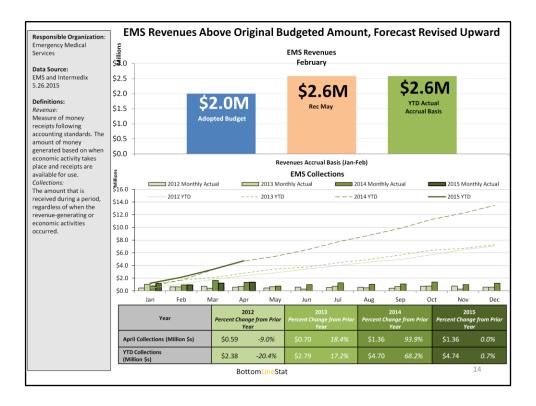




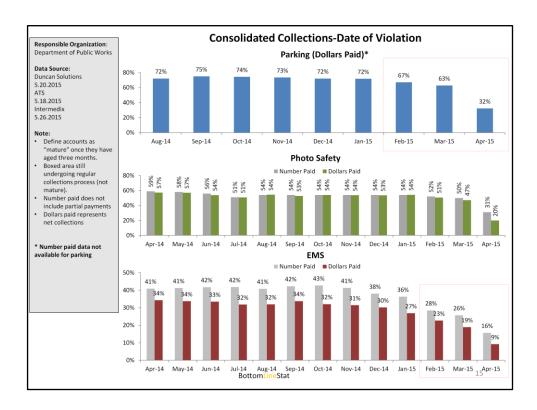


DPW reported that a radio system manufacturer will be coming in to repair inoperable flashers with signal issues. 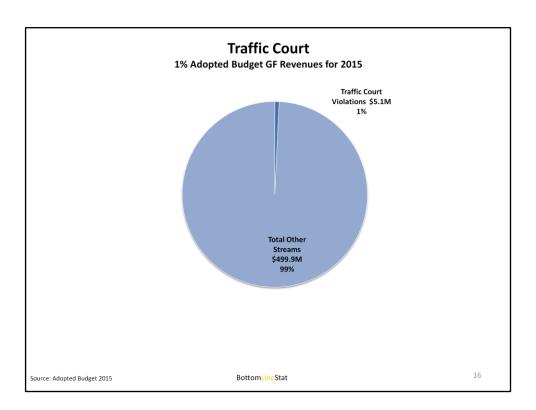


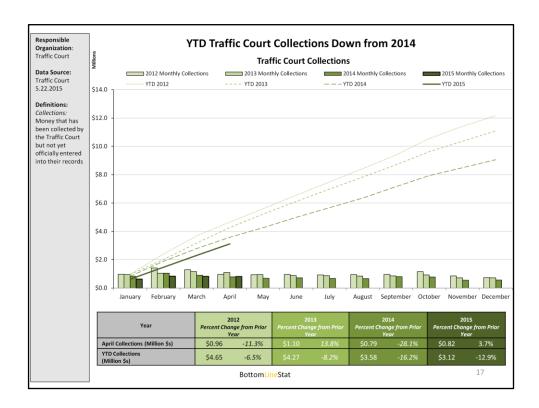


EMS reported that calls for service in Q1 2015 were up 8.9% from the previous year, though due to staffing issues a significant number of calls had to be rolled over.

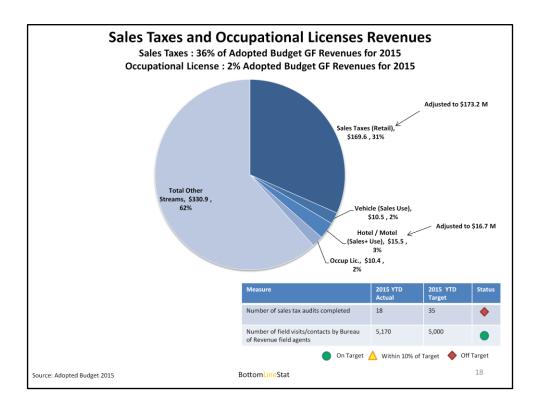


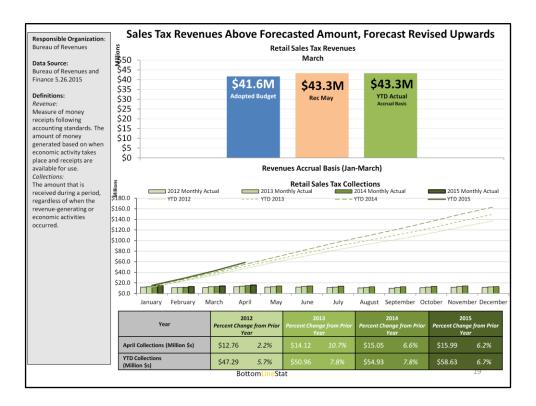
EMS reported that their collections rate is much higher than under the previous vendor.

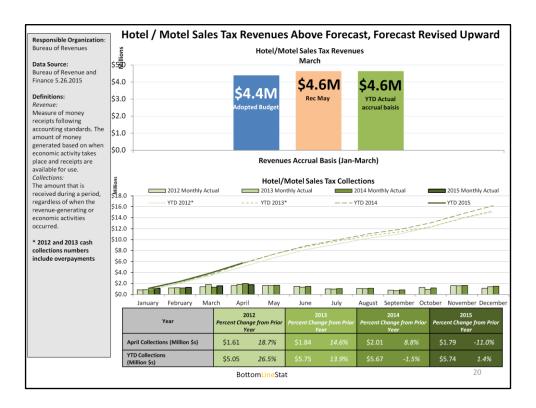




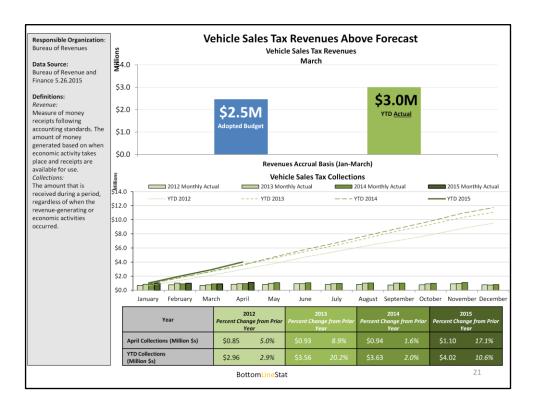
The City is currently in negotiations for a contract that will allow NOPD to write ecitations. Once the contract is in place, there will be a 3-6 month implementation period.

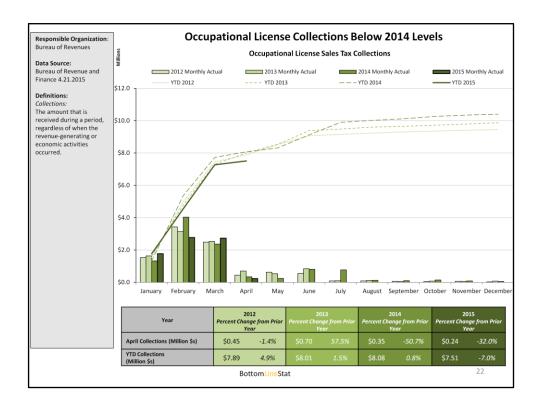




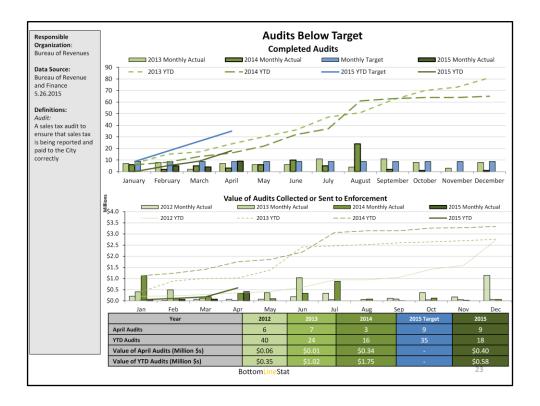


The reported collections in 2012 and 2013 are an overestimate by approximately \$100K per month due to an overpayment that has been refunded.

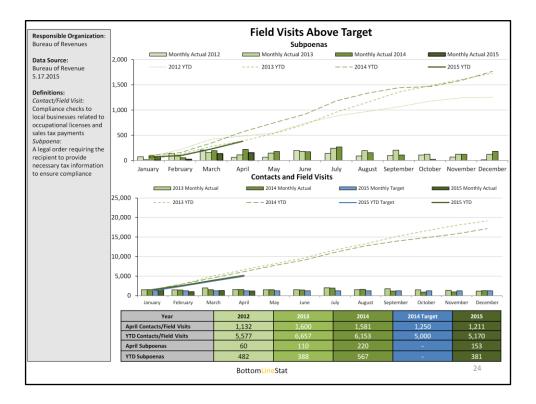




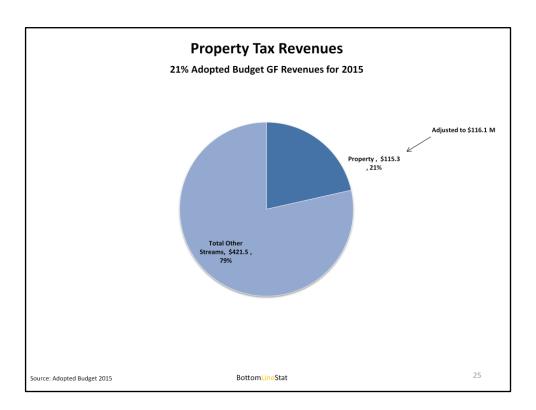
The Occupational License renewal deadline for 2015 was later than in past years, and the Bureau of Revenues anticipates that collections later in the year will account for the YTD decrease.

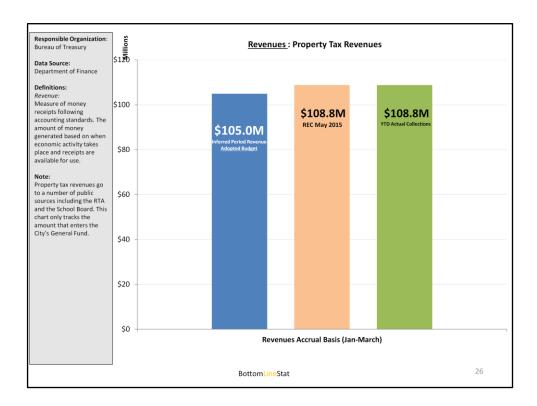


The Bureau of Revenues has experienced staff shortages, leading to a decrease in the number of audits completed. The Bureau is currently working to re-staff the audit unit, and is working with outside auditors to increase productivity. Audits completed by outside parties should be complete toward the end of 2015. Payment for the contracts will come from the collections received from the audits.

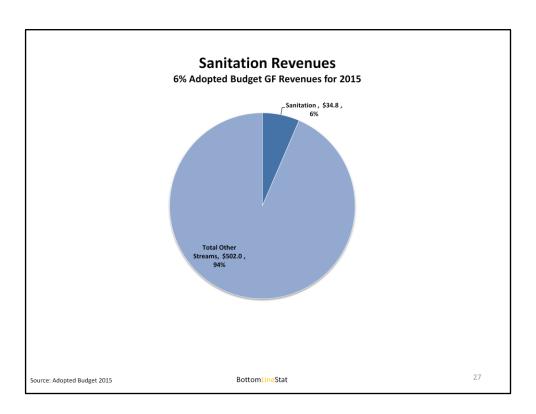


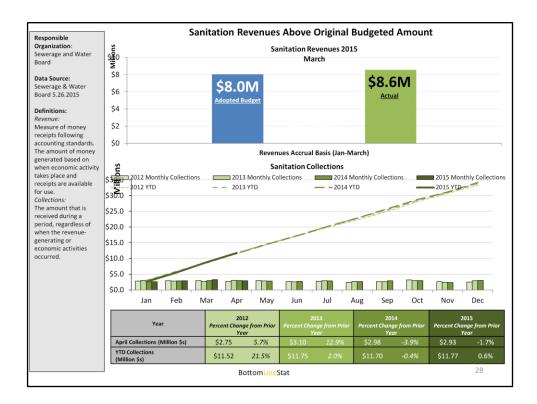
Field visits could fall below the target later in the year due to staff turnover.



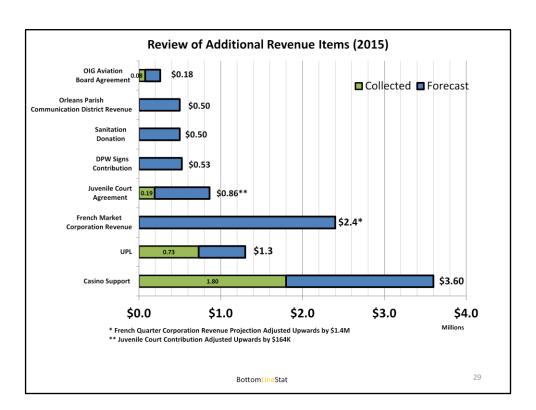


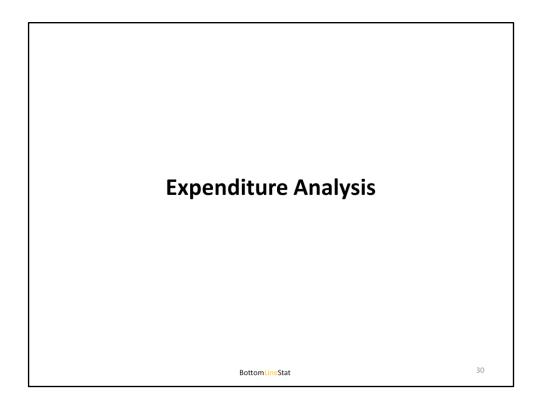
The City is holding an adjudicated property auction in early July.

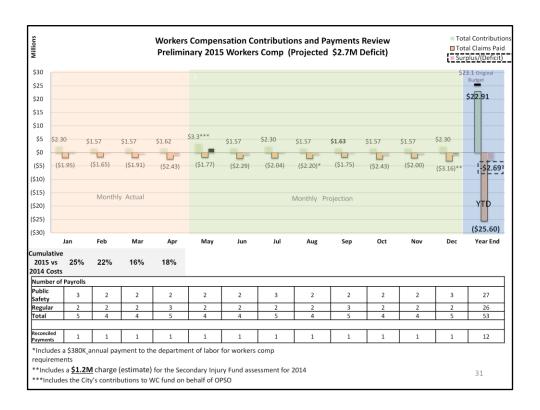


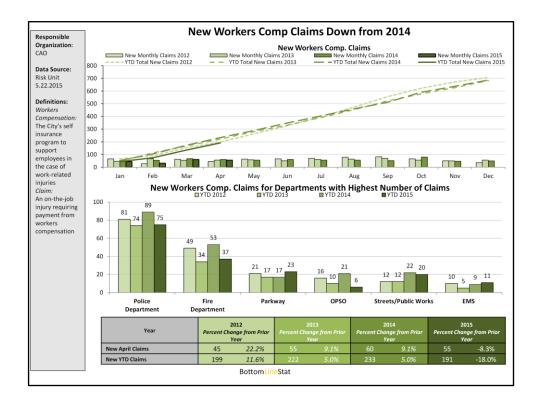


Collections were lower than in past years due to fewer payment periods in April compared to 2014.





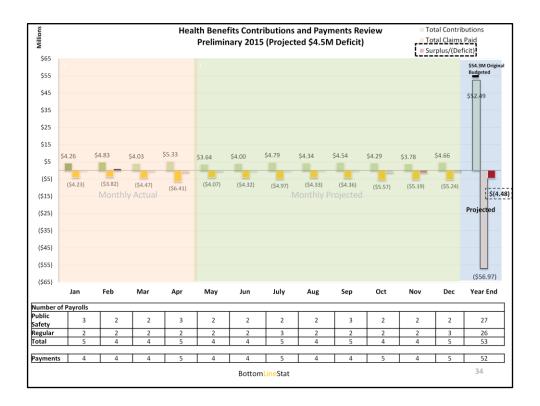




Risk Management reported that the light duty program for injured employees is up and running, which should decrease Worker's Compensation spending.

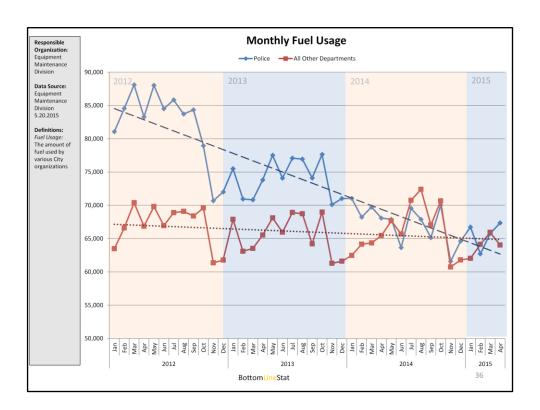

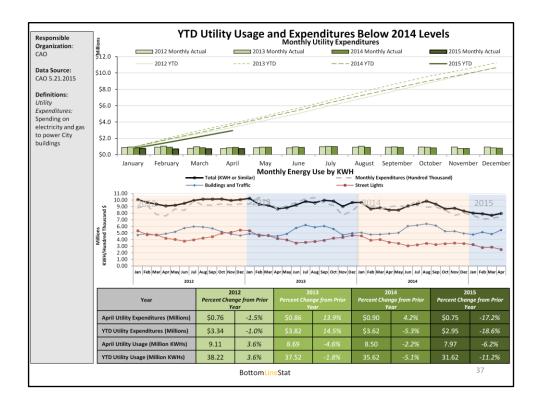
Risk Management reported that there are approximately 1,100 open claims.
